

What is RISM and How Does it Relate to Me (and the viola!)?

First off, what is RISM and how does it relate to me?

"The Répertoire International des Sources Musicales (RISM)—International Inventory of Musical Sources—is an international, non-profit organization that aims to comprehensively document extant musical sources worldwide: manuscripts, printed music editions, writings on music theory, and libretti that are found in libraries, archives, churches, schools, and private collections. RISM's over 1.4 million records can be searched at no cost through the RISM Catalog and RISM Online. RISM was founded in Paris in 1952 and is the largest and only global organization that documents written musical sources. RISM records what exists and where it can be found."

So, what does that mean? It's a massive database of documented

music. It takes some time digging, but there are oodles of pieces of music waiting to be "discovered" and brought to life. It's frequently thought there is a lack of historical repertoire specifically for viola. RISM is an incredible resource to find extant repertoire for viola (or any other orchestral instrument!). My primary base of knowledge is 18th-century viola concertos, so I will draw on examples from that.

What do I do if RISM is in another language?

Select English! (Figure 1)

How do I search for repertoire?

The abbreviations for the string family instruments are:

• Violin: vl

• Cello: vlc

Viola: vla

• Bass: cb




Figure 2 — Searching for Viola Concertos.

To search for a viola concerto, go to advanced search, put "vla" for scoring and "concertos" for genre. (Figure 2) To search for a chamber ensemble, use the abbreviations listed above to specify the

instrumentation. The search terms for some common ensembles are as follows:

- String quartet: vl (2), vla, vlc
- String quintet (2 violas): vl (2), vla (2), vlc
- String quintet (2 cellos): vl (2), vla, vlc (2)
- String quintet (with double bass): vl (2), vla, vlc, cb
- Piano trio: vl, vlc, pf

If you find a score that's not already digitized or published, and are interested in looking at the manuscript, each RISM entry will have the library sigla of where the manuscript can be found. A library sigla is an abbreviation assigned to an institution. A full list of sigla can be found here: https://rism.info/community/sigla.html

I've written to institutions and have had scores digitized for me. One thing I wish someone would have forewarned me is that correspondence in other parts of the world use a much more formal tone than is typically used in the States.

For example: Viola Concerto by Anton Fils

I chose this example because it highlights what can be found on a RISM entry. This piece is not published, but the manuscript has been digitized by the Sing-Akademie zu Berlin, Notenarchiv, Berlin (sigla D-Bsa).

I took a screenshot of the entry for this viola concerto. (Figure 3) If you click on the composer's name, information on them will pop up. (Figure 4)

Now for the most fun part of RISM! When you search for a

piece, you can "narrow results" to digitized sources only. (Figure 5) In an entry for a work (that has already been digitized)

In an entry for a work (that has already been digitized) under the title of the piece is an option to click "View Online." (Figure 6) Click this and it will bring you to the archive that has digitized the work.

Many of these works are terrible. *But*, through searching, I've found several gems. The result of my search for *Viola Concerto in D Major* by Anton
